PASTOR'S COMMENTARY

Describe the central tenet of the theology that informs your life in a single word.

I froze when that question was posed to a group of peers and me near the end of our seminary education. I had been prepared well. I was conversant in the 20 century history of the church, its thought, and belief. I debated the finer points of systematic theology – for fun! I knew how to preach, I knew the theory of liturgy and worship, I knew the Bible – in its original languages. I was confident! But that question silenced me; “Describe the central tenet of the theology that informs your life in a single word.”

A single word!? I gave the answer a couple of tries, but the best I could do was a couple of sentences. I wasn't sure there was a word that could hold all of what I believed and the search for the word was starting to make me wonder if I even knew what I believed. I fell flat. I didn't have an answer, so I was encouraged to keep thinking about it and try again a week later. I don't remember when it came to me, but by the following week I had my answer when the question came again; “In a single word, describe the central tenet of your theology.”

I said, “Fun.”

I got a few chuckles and a couple of blank stares, but I meant it. Fun, when I really thought about it, was at the center of my theology. With words like grace, joy, salvation, hope, love, etc., I felt that fun was more central to my theology than any other. You see, I realized at some point that I experienced all of those other wonderful things when I was having fun. To be together with people dear to me, feet together under the same table, laughing, enjoying one another, enjoying life – that's what Heaven looks like to me. To escape in the middle of a busy season out to the mountains for a hike – grace. Even to work really hard on an enjoyable project with creative and dedicated people is a kind of salvific experience for me. My soul comes alive; I am renewed when I'm having fun.

The questions came. "But how do you account for evil in the world? A durable theology has to be able to account for evil." They thought they had me in kind of Socratic trap. I was busted. My one word theology had been shown insufficient (who could have seen that coming?). "What is evil," I posed in return, "but the absence and destruction of fun?" Where young stomachs go empty and pangs of hunger distract there is no room for fun. When a person is being marginalized on the basis of their identity, I assure you they are having no fun. When the earth is destroyed by unsustainable practices and carelessness, the playground God has given us is decimated.

In the gospel according to John, Jesus proclaims that the purpose for his coming is that people might have life *abundantly*. I'm reasonably confident that "abundant" is code for "fun." Ok, ok. Yes, there are nuances of belief and practice that are profoundly important and have nothing to do with fun. In order for life to be truly abundant we have to experience a breadth of emotion and spirituality, but one could do worse, I maintain, than to incorporate fun into their theology. If you are seeking and finding opportunities for fun AND always working to make sure the fun is inclusive enough to include all people, you're off to a good start.

Next week, we at FBCR will invite the neighborhood surrounding our campus, and really all of Rochester to join us for a Block Party in celebration of our Bicentennial. We'll have games for kids, live music, good food, free ice cream, and lots and lots of friends new and existing. But why? Why would a church care about putting on a party for the neighborhood? Is it about attention, an "outreach" project? Well, I'm certainly not opposed to making new and more meaningful connections with our neighbors and raising the awareness of FBCR and who we are in the community, but no, "outreach" isn't really a primary purpose. Then is it a fundraiser? Are we charging an entry fee? No! Everything aside from the hamburgers and hot dogs will be free and they will be very inexpensive. Then we must be peddling something. We're starting a new program and we want a big event to announce it. No. We're proselytizing? NO! Are you kidding, no!! So what then? Why on earth would we bother with a Block Party?

Just for fun!

I Believe You, Anna Bowden

In our world, survivors of sexual assault (and reporters of sexual harassment) are frequently required to recount their stories of harassment/violence in an effort to garner support. We force *them* to make *us* believers. For my "What If" project, I want to change this. I want survivors to know that I (and we) believe them with or without their story. If you'd like to join me, here is how you can help.

I am collecting cards, letters, notes that simply say "I believe you" from as many people as possible. You don't need to wax eloquent, they simply need to be from your heart. A sample might read, "My name is Anna Bowden. I am a biblical scholar from Rochester, NY, and I want you to know that I believe you."

I am looking for people who are willing to write cards (about 6-12). I will collect the cards and distribute them to survivors along with a candle that reads "When you burn this candle, may it be a reminder that we believe you." If you are willing to write, write as many cards as you like and I can collect them from you at church. Additionally, feel free to share this message and/or collect cards from your friends, family, etc. I'd love to have as many voices as possible. 
